Weather can be described by observations and measurable quantities, such as temperature and precipitation</p> <p>Movement in the Sky/Seasons SC-E-2.3.3 Changes in movement of objects in the sky have patterns that can be observed and described. The Sun appears to move across the sky in the same way every day, but the Sun's apparent path changes slower over the seasons. The moon moves across the sky on a daily basis much like the Sun.
