2. On this page, click on Athena and Other Statues. Using this information answer the following:
 - A. Who created the statue of Athena?
 - B. Give 2 facts about her statue.
3. At the bottom of this page, pick one of the three world famous city icons. Use this in small or large version to answer the following:
 - C. Is the city icon decorative or functional?
 - D. What message does this icon give about its city? How does that message reflect what is important?
 - E. What icon do you think Lexington should create that symbolizes our city?

- J. Do you think buildings designed in the 21st century will be in the style of the Parthenon? Why or why not?

- K. How many tons of marble built the Parthenon?
